PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Engaged Liberal Arts and Sciences (ELAS) courses are designed to connect **classroom theory** with **engagement activities** to promote an **enhanced learning experience**. Students work with different geographies, organizations, and programs in local communities, or in the communities where Bard's national and international partners are based. ELAS courses tap into students' ability to pull from their various skills and life experiences in an environment that is **academically challenging** and **outwardly resounding**. Many students find themselves learning new skills or utilizing their strengths in unique ways by taking on creative, engaging, or sustainable projects.

ELAS FUN FACTS:

- During the 2019-2020 academic year, **700+** students participated in over **60** courses which collaborated with over **80** community agencies/organizations
- **89%** of students report that they attained a greater awareness of community issues
- **88%** of students stated that their experience with community engagement helped their learning
- **88%** of students state that they would take another ELAS course
- **91%** of faculty would teach another ELAS course
- **87%** of faculty would recommend to a colleague to teach an ELAS course
