The Landscape and Arboretum Program at Bard will host its annual Arbor Day celebration on Friday, April 30. This event will mark the third anniversary of the dedication of the Bard campus as an arboretum. The day's activities will include a ceremonial tree planting of a Princeton Elm (*Ulmus americana* 'Princeton') on the historic "Elm Walk", the road located between Stone Row and the Chapel of Holy Innocents. The planting is part of a series of many plantings aimed at restoring the elm allee that was removed due to its decline from Dutch elm disease.

The Bard Arboretum will also host an open house event in the Bertelsmann Campus Center. Amy Parrella, Arboretum Director will be on hand to talk about the arboretum and answer questions. Educational information and tree brochures will be available. Locally made tree t-shirts and tote bags will be available for purchase. Visitors can also pick up information on registering for the summer horticultural classes co-sponsored with The New York Botanical Garden Continuing Education Program, and becoming a friend of the Arboretum at Bard.
