
Undergraduate Faculty Highlights and Accomplishments Summer 2023

Memorv and Enslavement: Schuyler House, Old Saratoga, and the Saratoga Patent in History, Historical Practice, and Historical Imagination, by Myra B. Young Armstead, was published in May 2023 by The National Park Service (in cooperation with Organization the of American Historians).



Drawing inspiration from **Ephraim Asili's** 2020 film "Inheritance," the group exhibition "Inheritance" is currently installed at the Whitney Museum through February 2024. The exhibition includes work by forty-three leading artists, including Asili and **An-My Le**.

Work, Sometimes, a solo exhibition by Mara Baldwin, was at the Everson Museum in Syracuse, NY, June 24 through August 6, 2023. *Counting the Seconds Between Lightning and Thunder*, a group exhibition including work by Baldwin, is currently at the Wassaic Project (Wassaic, NY) through September 5, 2023.



"A Resurrection Fallacy," by **Bruce Chilton** appeared in *Misusing Scripture. What are Evangelicals Doing with the Bible?* Routledge New Critical Thinking in Religion, Theology, and Biblical Studies (edited by Mark Elliott, Kenneth Atkinson, and Robert Rezetko; Abingdon and New York: Routledge, 2023). Chilton's book, *Resurrection Logic*, was reviewed in *Modern Believing* 64.2 (2023). A written interview ("Was Jesus a Rabbi?") appeared in *From the*

Desk, with Kurt Manwaring, and The Israel Study Center published a recorded interview ("Jesus as Mamzer") with Ywshaya Gruber. Christ Church in Bath, England, hosted his lecture "How Jesus Invented the Eucharist" during a period that saw him principally engaged with his current project, "The Aramaic Jesus."

In June 2023, Adhaar Noor Desai presented a Zoom workshop in celebration of his new monograph, *Blotted Lines: Early Modern English Literature and the Poetics of Discomposition* (Cornell), for The Renaissance Project. In July 2023, he was interviewed about the monograph for New Books Network in <u>a podcast episode</u>, and he joined **Krista Caballero, Dominique Townsend** and Sanjay Kumar (CEU) in organizing the OSUN-funded Experimental Humanities Collaborative Network Conference at the Universidad de Los Andes in Bogotá, Colombia.

In June and July 2023, **Jack Ferver** directed the staged workshop of TWITCH, a new play by Liliana Padilla at Williamstown Theater Festival, co-produced with Breaking The Binary Theater Festival. They continued work on TWITCH at New York Stage and Film.

"Macho Sensibilities: An Autoethnographic Journey," by Yebel Gallegos, was published in *Dance in US Popular Culture*, (edited by Jen Atkins, Routlegde, 2023). Gallegos also performed in the *CONCEPT series: Hudson Valley Edition*, produced by the contemporary dance company <u>RAWdance</u>. This dance performance is a part of the San Francisco dance scene and made its Hudson Valley debut this summer, presenting choreographers sharing works-in-progress or repertory tailored for an intimate viewing experience.

In July 2023, Erica Kaufman joined Joan Retallack and Simone White along with PoemTalk host, Al Filreis, to discuss Tina Darragh's poem, "Wire Boxes" (<u>PoemTalk</u> <u>#186: The dots move out</u>); and Kaufman gave a poetry reading at Familiar Trees bookstore in Great Barrington, MA. The spring/summer 2023 issue of Hauser & Wirth's journal <u>Ursula</u>, includes several poems by Kaufman, as well as a three-way interview between Kaufman, Matt Longabucco and Nicole Eisenman.

"A Productive Friction: Joshua Glick on Ways to Transform the Current Corporate-Dominated Documentary Culture," by **Joshua Glick**, was published in *Filmmaker* vol. 31:4 (Summer 2023).

Recent performances and teaching by **Marka Gustavsson** include: performances and teaching at KentMusic with Manhattan String Quartet at Colgate, and in Seattle; Chamber music concert performances in New Hampshire for North Country Chamber Players, and in New York for the Chamber Music Conference of the Northeast; and the Young Artists' Program at Yellow Barn in Putney, VT.

Living in Words: Literature, Autobiographical Language, and the Composition of Selfhood, by Garry L. Hagberg, was published by Oxford University Press in June 2023.

Works by **Maggie Hazen** were included in the group exhibition, *Bellyache*, at Chart Gallery in NY from July 12, 2023 through August 18, 2023. Hazen's artwork, "Hidden in Plein Sight," was featured on a billboard on Greene County Route 23A in Hunter, NY, from August 1, 2023 through August 28, 2023 as part of the exhibition *A Copious Flow* by Shandaken Projects and co-sponsored by the Athens Cultural Center. She was also awarded a Summer 2023 Workspace Residency from Squeaky Wheel to work on the mixed reality project, *Night Moth: A Mythology of Escape*; and she was a grantee recipient of the 2023 Media Arts Assistance Fund (MAAF) for Artists.



In July 2023, Sarah Hennies was Artist in Residence at

the Avaloch Farm Music Institute in Boscawen, NM, and in August 2023, she was the featured composer for the Darmstadt International Summer Course, with world premieres of "Motor Tapes" by Ensemble Dedalus (France) and "Borrowed Light" by Mivos String Quartet (NYC).

During her research trip to Morocco in June 2023, supported by the One Earth/Daughters for Earth project "Empowering Women-led Moroccan Weavers in Innovative Bioregional Plant and Microbial Dyeing," Brooke Jude traveled to the cities of Tangier, Rabat, Casablanca, Azrou, M'Rirt, and Ain Leuh, met with research collaborators from Universities and national parks, and worked with a women's weaving collective in the Atlas Mountains. She was also invited to give two seminars: Microbes for the win: natural dyes for anti-microbial athletic wear, part of the Journée Scientifique Sciences Et Sport de Haut Niveau at L'Institut Royal de Formation des Cadres in Rabat, and The Violet Microbiome, part of World Microbiome Day Celebration, held at Hôpital Universitaire International Cheikh Khalifa at UM6SS, Mohammed VI University of Health Sciences, in Casablanca Morocco.

Suzanne Kite was awarded the 2023 Forge Fellowship. Indian Theater: Native Performance, Art, and Self-Determination since 1969, an exhibition that features Kite's work, is currently being held at the Center for Curatorial Studies through November 26, 2023, and was featured in <u>Artsy</u> as one of five stand out exhibitions showcasing the work of Indigenous American Artists. Kite's work is featured in a new book, An Indigenous Present, edited by Jeffrey Gibson. A tea dance and a book launch was held at SITE Santa Fe in Santa Fe, New Mexico in August 2023.

During the summer of 2023, **Maria Simpson** and two of her colleagues launched the online teaching resource, <u>Three Ballet Teachers</u>, funded in part by a Bard Research Fund Grant. The website provides teachers of all levels of experience with choreographed center-floor sequences that can be used in full or in part, or as inspiration for their own classes.

In September 2023, **Robert Tynes** released his study, *the State of Hate Index II (SoHI II)*, through the Bard Center for the Study of Hate (BCSH). SoHI II examines how hate manifests, and is constrained, in the 50 states of the U.S., looking at multiple indicators in order to suggest where hate might be more likely to occur. <u>The initial Index (SoHI)</u> was published in 2021. SoHI II is an updated version that accounts for the increasing levels of verbal, legal and physical animosity generated in America.

The group exhibition, *Collection 1970s–Present: Limits of Control,* includes work by **Julia Weist** and is currently at The Museum of Modern Art through February 1, 2024.
